

8th Grade Observatory Field Trip

This year, the eighth grade class has started off the year with an astronomy unit in science class. On Friday, September 21st, we had the opportunity to go visit an actual working observatory at Truman State University, hosted by the Stargazers Club.

Although the weather did not cooperate enough to view much of the night sky, students were able to gain knowledge and first-hand experience with setting up and taking down a telescope, looking through a telescope and overall just understanding what an observatory is and how they work. Students rotated through three stations — the warm room, the main telescope and the outside viewing area.

In the warm room, students were able to learn more about the constellations, where and how to find them and even see what the night sky would look like if they were standing on different planets! Most students agreed that the warm room was their favorite part because they were able to see the different constellations and learn about the mythology behind them. The main thing that people identify with the observatory is the dome, which houses their main telescope, a seventeen inch Celestron. Although we weren't able to use the large scope,

Finally, outside on the main viewing area students were able to practice setting up a telescope, pointing the scope to celestial objects and then taking the scope off of the pedestal properly. The clouds thinned just enough to see the light

of the moon and Vega, one of the seasons brightest stars.

To wrap up the night, the members of the Stargazers Club talked to everyone about the research that they work on at the observatory. Their research covers anything from astrophotography to searching


